President's Message: A New Threat to the Niantic River

VP Deb Moshier-Dunn wrote the following letter to the editor to announce our new #SmartSolar Project. I wanted to share this news with you and thought that the letter was a good place to start. Stay tuned to our Facebook page for updates as we go through the intervenor process and hold the solar company responsible for water quality in its Petition to the CT Siting Council.

"Save the River-Save the Hills has recently discovered that the 55,000 solar-panel project in Waterford is proposed to be on 93 acres in a currently forested area between two tributaries to the Niantic River: Oil Mill Brook and Stony Brook, not at the original site of the old Waterford Airport or the landfill. While we are a strong supporter of renewable solar energy, we feel that this site off Oil Mill Road in Waterford is an inappropriate place to install it.

Waterford has spent taxpayers money to study the tributaries to the Niantic River and to create plans to protect the water quality of this estuary. In 2009, the town paid for the creation of The Stony Brook Watershed Management Plan. In 2006, the state of Connecticut, with the help of the four towns in the watershed and some Clean Water Act federal monies, produced the Niantic River Watershed Protection Plan. Both documents contain guidelines and recommendations to reduce stormwater runoff, the number one cause of pollution in the Niantic River. The proposed plans supporting the petition for the solar installation ignore these two plans.

STR-STH has officially requested to be an intervener in the solar company's Petition for a Declaratory Ruling from the Connecticut Siting Counsel to start the work on the installation this fall without a public hearing or environmental review. We have hired an attorney & a professional engineer to review the plans of the proposed installation and have confirmed our fears that the company proposing the solar project has not learned from the devastating results from the installation they created on Walnut Hill Road in East Lyme. (In 2014, the East Lyme site discharged silt and destroyed area wetlands on another tributary to the Niantic River. There is currently a lawsuit from downstream property owners against the same company.) The Waterford plans do not have sufficient stormwater mitigation built into the construction or the final product. STR-STH has worked too hard for too long on water quality in the Niantic River to allow it to be potentially destroyed by stormwater runoff from this proposed solar farm.

Also, it makes no sense to deforest an area and degrade water quality in the Niantic River to provide solar energy. We have been fighting for 15 years to keep development from happening in the Oswegatchie Hills which overlook the Niantic River, so that the ecosystem of the river won't be destroyed. This solar installation, as proposed, could do the same damage as developing the Hills, especially given the track record of the company in East Lyme.

Save the River Save the Hills is for solar energy, but not at the expense of water quality. This should not be a trade-off. The town and the state should find an area that creates a win for everyone. #SMARTSOLAR Yours in Saving the River and the Hills, Fred Grimsey

Program Updates:

Education/Outreach Grant Update

It's back to school for Save the River-Save the Hills, as we implement the environmental grants we reported in our last newsletter.

Thursday, September 27, was Niantic River Watershed Day at Waterford High School. which hosted a seminar and field trip for students from East Lyme and Montville High Schools. The program brought together young scientists from all four towns in our watershed to participate in a collaborative session explaining the causes of nitrogen pollution and what the towns, Niantic River Watershed Committee, and state and federal agencies are doing to reduce further degradation of water quality in the estuary and LI Sound.

Presenters included Kelly Streich, CT Department of Energy and Environmental Protection, Dr. Jamie Vaudrey, UConn Marine Sciences professor who is studying impaired embayments along Long Island Sound, Judy Rondeau of NRWC and James Gallagher, East Lyme Public Trust Foundation volunteer. Our thanks, also, to Victor Benni, East Lyme Public Works, for his guided tour of the town's Outdoor Stormwater Classroom at Hole in the Wall Beach, to Maureen Fitzgerald, Waterford Environmental Planner and to Mike Marelli for the Pumpout Boat demonstration.

In coming months, students will engage in public education and outreach projects and campaigns in their home towns, encouraging residents to reduce their pollution runoff into ARCGIS map of Niantic River the region's tributaries.

Rain Barrel and Water Conservation Festival—by Petie Reed

Join us Saturday, Oct 20 at Perennial Harmony, (144 Boston Post Rd, EL) from 10am to 3pm to build your own Rain Barrel for Free! Organized by an Eagle Scout prospect with Dan Mullins & sponsored by the Eastern Connecticut Conservation District (ECCD), this event will raise awareness about the need to protect and conserve our shared water resources. It features music and free refreshments, but more importantly, local conservation organizations will be there to raise awareness about the many issues facing our waterways including the Niantic River and Long Island Sound.
